Introduction

General Annual Meeting – October 14th- 15th, 2020

Usually October is the month of the ERN-EYE annual workshop. This year, as the General Annual Meeting in March had to be postponed and as it is still not possible to do face-toface meetings, ERN-EYE organised its meeting in virtual from 14th to 15th October 2020. It brought together close to 150 participants, mainly health care providers members and affiliated partners, ePAG members, as well as prestigious speakers.

The sessions were opened by Hélène Dollfus, coordinator of ERN-EYE. To introduce the meeting, Vytenis Andriukaitis, Former Health Commissioner and WHO Special Envoy for the European region from March 2020, Birute Tumiene, Board of Member States Representative of Lithuania, and Enrique Terol, , ERNs Policy officer for the European Commission, gave an overview of the current state of ERNs in Europe.

The first day was dedicated to the state of the art regarding guidelines

and registry. The second day of the Virtual Meeting was dedicated to the affiliated partners. In addition to the initial 29 full members, today ERN-EYE has 15 affiliated partners in 7 new countries (i.e. not covered by full members). It was a great chance for them to introduce their centre and activities.

The meeting ended with a research session during which European calls, including European Joint Program for Rare Diseases (EJP-RD). A specific call on humanities and research in rare diseases and the participation of ERN-EYE were presented. Finally, parallel sessions with the different working groups allowed to discuss key topics such as specific guidelines and e-learning for each of them.

This Virtual Meeting was successful, but we hope that the next workshop will be face-to-face!

ERNs in brief

European Reference Networks (ERNs) are unique and innovative cross-border cooperation platforms between specialists for the diagnosis and treatment of rare or low prevalence complex diseases.

ERNs are virtual networks bringing together healthcare providers across Europe to tackle complex medical or rare conditions that require highly specialized treatment and a concentration of knowledge and resources. They are being set up under the EU Directive on Patients' Rights in Healthcare (2011/24/EU), which also makes it easier for patients to access information on healthcare and thus increase their treatment options.

The ERNs are supported by European cross-border telemedicine tools, and can benefit from a range of EU funding mechanisms such as the "Health Program", the "Connecting Europe Facility" and the EU research program "Horizon 2020".

This meeting was an opportunity to speak about the upcoming ERN-EYE challenges, and the challenges ahead, especially the registry, the guidelines and the new members.

DAY 1 - OPENING - ERN-EYE WHERE ARE WE NOW?

General objectives of the meeting

The workshop was opened by Hélène Dollfus, coordinator of ERN-EYE, Birute Tumiene, Board of Member States Representative, Vytenis Andriukaitis, Former Health Commissioner, Enrique Terol, DG SANTE, and Russell Wheeler, ERN-EYE e-PAG Representative. Hélène Dollfus was happy to welcome all attendees for this first ERN-EYE virtual meeting, an excellent opportunity to deeply deal with "hottest" topics for Rare Eye Diseases. Enrique Terol highlighted the future challenges of the network: enlargement, monitoring and guidelines, which are also the topics of the meeting.

SESSION 1 GUIDELINES & TRAINING SESSION

The guideline challenge for ERNs

Hélène Dollfus, ERN-EYE coordinator

Hélène Dollfus, as an introduction to the meeting, gave an overview of the planned schedule regarding guidelines based on concrete examples. She mentioned the need of a clear methodology from the provider appointed by the Commission, a training for involved experts, the endorsement of existing guidelines and the role of a medical writer to organize the work and help experts to write.



Presentation of the timeline and work packages of the CPG Programme to the ERNs

Maria Redondo Berdugo, Fundación Progreso y Salud, Sevilla, Spain



Maria Redondo Berdugo presented the timeline and work packages of the CPG Programme. She insisted on the fact that there is a need for a structural framework to facilitate collaborative research among ERNs. There are two principal strategies: 1) Central engagement of Members of all ERNs in all project activities.

2) Seeking strategic partnerships with all major European and international RD research stakeholders

Training & e-Learning in ERNs, ERN-EYE strategy

Dorothée Leroux, ERN-EYE project manager



Dorothée Leroux presented the progress of the ERN-EYE elearning programme as well as the webinar, educational videos and training projects. Last year, ERN-EYE diffused two educational videos:

1) How to welcome visually impaired people in the

hospital (mostly for nonspecialists professionals)

2) Covid-19: Protective measures at your fingertips (mostly for patients)

The ERN-EYE knowledge generation work is a key part of the network's activities.

A good start and many projects for the next year!

SESSION 2 REDGISTRY SESSION

The ERN-EYE basic registry: REDgistry

Dorothée Leroux, ERN-EYE project manager

Dorothée Leroux spoke about the ERN-EYE registry. She reminded that a basic registry is urgently needed in Europe for all Patients with Rare Eye Diseases for epidemiology and Clinical Trials recruitment. This registry is our major goal from the beginning of the network. The ERN-EYE registry, now granted, is called REDgistry and will integrate the ontology work done in Sainte-Odile. Based on the work done for the Clinical Patient management System, ERN-EYE defined a minimum dataset with



few items but shared across all ERN-EYE centers.



REDgistry technical solution driven by open app

Con Hennessy, Open App, Dublin, Ireland



Con Hennessy presented the open app solution for clinical and

patient registries. To fit ERN-EYE needs, he focussed his speech on the functionalities of his technical solution. He presented the Virtual Collaboration Platform, the patient consultation workflow, medical image viewers possibilities, records assess, full time-line of events. He also presented the

The EU RD Platform: an EU hub for RD registries

Andri Papadopoulou, Joint Research Center, Ispra, Italy

Andri Papadopoulou spoke about the European Rare Disease Registries Infrastructure (ERDRI) platform and its tools for ERNs registries. Noticeably she presented the EUPID service, a peudonymisation tool. She insisted on the fact that EUPID offered to all registries joining the EU RD Platform to prevent duplicate registration of patients. It offers a provision of distinct pseudonyms for patients in different contexts and a preservation of the possibility for reidentification by a trusted third party. The pseudonymisation process is essential to have a reliable registry.

The presentation of the European Directory of registries and the metadata repository as the two possible future upgrade, links with other registries (National registries for example) or CPMS, and HL7 hospital integration.

It was a good opportunity for all ERN-EYE members to have a demonstration of the platform and to ask their questions.



major components of the FAIRification of ERNs registries was highly important to ERN-EYE members, futures daily users of REDgistry.

The data protection challenge

Petra Wilson, Healthcare Practice Brussels, Belgium



Petra Wilson presented the challenge of data protection in registries. Key questions are the recognition of disease registries national law to provide a legal base for care and research, specific guidance for research ethics committees, support to hospital DPO from national DPA,

development of a suitable function for disease registries in the EHDS and specialist law or code of conduct at EU level. These questions are crucial for all the clinicians involved in our REDgistry development.

The next steps for HCPs and Working Groups

Hélène Dollfus, ERN-EYE coordinator



Hélène Dollfus reminded that the registry is obligatory for all ERNs. All have to keep in mind the objectives as a benefit for all patients. Registry generates epidemiology data and information for trials, it is an open platform to «plug in» other registries: specific syndromes, groups of diseases, etc. Each ERN-EYE HCP will have to nominate one representative for REDgistry governance Board.

SESSION 3 CPMS SESSION CPMS activity report for 2019

Dorothée Leroux, ERN-EYE project manager

Dorothée Leroux reminded what CPMS is: a complete system with secure access, with secure storage, pseudonymized data, used for data collection and panel members review, with a complete online meeting system and outcome document generation. This system is supported by the European

Commission. With a regular increase of users (except during the spring 2020 COVID crisis), in September 2020, ERN-EYE had a little more than 50 active users upon 66 registered users.



Helpdesk activity report

Francesco Rotolo, ERN-EYE CPMS IT specialist



Francesco Rotolo presented the activities of the helpdesk team based in Strasbourg. The Helpdesk provided the CPMS members several tools for a better and easier use of the CPMS, especially tutorials, user guide, webinars. Members can find the documents and procedures in a dedicated section named "CPMS-Virtual Clinic" at <u>https://www.emeye.eu/em-eye</u>. In October 2020 there are 66 registered users, 17 more than in 2019.

A new start for the CPMS: The need to boost, (with affiliated partners, trainees, ex conferences, ...)

Hélène Dollfus, ERN-EYE coordinator

The Clinical patient management System is now online for 2 years already. ERN-EYE developed an EYE-Specific dataset and a helpdesk and guidance to help users. But the number of panels is still very low. Hélène Dolffus insisted on the fact that it needs urgently a way to improve the use of CPMS. She proposes to have a grand round meeting every two months for each WG called GREET online meeting with cases and seniors experts engaged in the meeting.

pipeline "from bench to bedside" ensuring rapid translation of research results into clinical applications and uptake in healthcare for the benefit of patients. The mode of action is a large programme that integrates existing infrastructures, trainings, funding programmes and tools, expands them and develops new essential ones to

harmonized offer (and centralized) RD research ecosystem that is easy to use for scientists and produces benefits for patients in the most efficient way. She also presented the Joint Transnational Call 2021 that supports transnational, innovative, and interdisciplinary Social Sciences and Humanities research projects.

Humanities & research in rare diseases: examples

Laura Benkemoun, Fondation Maladies Rares, Strasbourg, France

Laura Benkemoun presented the state of the art in the field of humanities and research in terms of calls for projects related to rare diseases in France and Europe. The French Rare Diseases Foundation supports this aspect in order to improve the journey of patients with rare diseases.



Closing session

<u>Hélène Dollfus</u>, ERN-EYE coordinator

Hélène Dollfus concluded the virtual meeting with a summary of the main points that were mentioned. ERN-EYE needs to develop guidelines and improve the CPMS. There will be also big changes with the Brexit issue and the new members' integration. It will certainly be financially more complicated for meetings with around 150 to 200 people per meeting but nevertheless we hope that the next workshop will be face-to-face! She thanked all the speaker and participants, hoping the virtual platform was a great virtual solution to work together during the pandemic.

After the meeting, the ERN-EYE management team spread out a satisfaction survey to collect the opinion of the participants.


49 people answered the survey, representing one third of the participants at the meeting.



The results are presented below, question by question, with the percentages of responses.









We noted that the participants were generally satisfied with the progress and organization of the meeting. This time, the duration of one day and a half seemed to be good, a little too long for some of them.










The registration was efficient for the participants but some of them would receive the documentation earlier.
















The virtual platform made it possible to satisfy almost all the participants.
